## STATEMENT OF EVIDENCE OF TREVOR JOHN NEWBROOK

## INTRODUCTION

1. My full name is Trevor John Newbrook. I currently reside at 40 Robertson Street, Glenholme, Rotorua.

2. You will note my address is different to when I submitted to the original Resource

Consent Applications, 20 Sumner Street, Glenholme, Rotorua where we also operated

two B&B guest rooms. On 7 February 2024 our home was burgled and then set on fire

by someone we understand was living in an emergency housing motel.

3. The top floor of our home has been demolished and the ground floor completely

gutted. The rebuild started on 13 August 2024 with a completion date of the end of

February 2025. We lost most of our personal and precious belongings (some with no

monetary value but huge sentimental value to us).

4. I submit this brief of evidence in support of Restore Rotorua Incorporated (Restore

Rotorua), to assist the independent Commissioner who will decide on the question of

whether all of the Ministry of Housing and Urban Development's (MHUD) resource

consent applications before the Rotorua Lakes Council (RLC) to continue to use seven

motels in central Rotorua for contracted emergency housing.

5. I previously gave evidence for Restore Rotorua at the original resource consent

application hearing in October 2022. At that time, I was the Chair of Restore Rotorua

and currently remain in that role.

6. As a member of Restore Rotorua, I am prepared if required to answer any questions

concerning this brief of evidence from the Commissioner.

7. In this brief I give evidence as:

(a) A long-term resident of Glenholme, Rotorua, who was operating our home as

a B&B; and

(b) The Chairman of Restore Rotorua since the formation of the society and on our

advocacy with the Council.

8. I am familiar with the matters set out in this brief of evidence, and they are true to the

best of my knowledge and belief.

Family, work and life in Rotorua

9. Our home is located approximately 300 metres, a 4-minute walk, from Fenton Street,

the proverbial golden mile in Rotorua. Many of the proposed transitional and

emergency housing sites are situated on or near Fenton Street.

10. I am 69 years old. My family and I moved to Rotorua in 1965, when I was ten. Apart

from a period of 10 years away, I have lived in Rotorua the rest of my life.

11. Both my wife's and my families are well-known in Rotorua. My wife Rosemary was

born and bred in Rotorua and grew up on Carnot Street approximately 120 metres

from Fenton Street where her parents lived for over 40 years. She has always lived in

Rotorua apart from the 10 years we lived away.

12. We absolutely love Rotorua and have loved living in Glenholme. It was a safe, friendly,

and nice neighbourhood. We are passionate about our city and had planned to spend

the rest of our retirement years here.

13. My wife Rosemary and I have three adult children. Rosemary attended Glenholme

Primary School, as did our children when they were young. Some of our grandchildren

are currently third generation students at Glenholme School. I was on the Glenholme

School Board of Trustees and served as Chairman of the Parent Teacher Association. I

was a Councillor and Deputy Mayor on the South Waikato District Council between

1995 and 2002.

14. My family's presence in the local community led to people in Rotorua approaching me

to voice their feedback on, amongst other things, the emergency and transitional

housing issue. I have received emails, phone calls and people have found me on social

media, including my Facebook page, and messaged me directly. Some were people

with whom I have never interacted. I have also been stopped on the street while I

have been out by people wanting to speak to me on this issue.

15. The clear anxieties of those who approached me, and the scale of the Rotorua

community's reaction to the influx of transitional and emergency housing in Rotorua,

impressed on me that there was a need for more structured and organised action. I

note in particular the telephone conversations I have had about establishing an

incorporated society to serve as a united stakeholder group through which the local

community could voice their concerns. I contemplated my suitability for the role of

Chairman and spokesperson, and decided that I should take up those positions for the

group.

16. Restore Rotorua was formally incorporated on 29 September 2021.

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**On-going role of Restore Rotorua** 

17. Restore Rotorua has continued to work for the community to advocate for the

extensive use of motels as emergency housing to stop. I believe you are well aware of

the negative effects on the people of Rotorua, especially those living in Glenholme.

18. I believe there has been some improvement since the new Government took office in

December 2023. However, we need to continue to work to get Rotorua and The

Golden Mile back to what it was.

19. Restore Rotorua has always supported genuine people being housed in appropriate

and suitable housing. Especially the elderly and those with children.

20. Restore Rotorua does not believe that motels are a suitable long-term answer for

housing people. Motels were built as short-term holiday accommodation and do not

have the facilities needed for permanent housing. Most do not have suitable outdoor

living spaces or outside play areas for children.

21. Following the Commissioner's Decision in December 2022, the then Chief Executive of

RLC invited us to meet with him and another senior staff member. We had three or

four such meetings and although there was talk of RLC taking action against motels

that did not comply nothing ever came of it.

22. Unfortunately, I have not been able to attend the Community Liaison Group (CLG)

meetings (except the last one) but understand from Restore Rotorua secretary Jenny

Peace, who has attended all, that they have not been very effective. I am sure Jenny

will address this in her evidence.

23. Restore Rotorua secretary Jenny Peace raised the issue of MHUD having to provide its

exit plan six months before the resource consents expired.

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24. The CLG meeting I did attend on 26 September 2024 was really a bit pointless in my

opinion. There was a council report presented on the monitoring of Contracted

Emergency Housing (CEH) Motels. The moteliers present questioned the need for this

and raised concerns about the cost. It turned out that this report has to be done to

comply with the Resource Consents and therefore there is no extra cost presenting it

to CLG. There was a lot of discussion amongst the moteliers about Airbnb and how it

has affected accommodation providers in Rotorua and across the world. After some

time I had to ask the chair to bring the meeting back to the agenda.

25. Both MHUD and the motel representatives at the CLG meeting said it would be

"mayhem" if the extensions were not granted. This is MHUD's fault for not even trying

to comply with the original Resource Consents and to date nobody has been held

accountable.

26. The issue of safety was raised by a community representative regarding the car park

at Apollo Hotel, 7 Tyron Street. She asked why it was not fenced like other CEH

properties as often vehicles drive in and out quite fast and it was dangerous as they

cross the footpath. The response from the motel representatives was to say it was too

expensive, a waste of money and asked how many accidents there have been.

27. Restore Rotorua had never been asked by MHUD to meet to discuss CEH until they

were directed by the Minister to meet with us after the sudden announcement that

they were intending to apply for a 2-year extension for the ten Resource Consents. I

think we have met three times which has been very constructive and helpful.

28. Prior to the election Restore Rotorua as an advocate group had separate meetings

with Christopher Luxon, Nicola Willis, Chris Bishop, Tama Potaka and Todd McClay (MP

for Rotorua). The National Party campaigned during the 2023 General Election on

ending the emergency housing in Rotorua by December 2025.

29. Since the MHUD announcement that they were applying for extensions for two years

for ten CEH Motels, we have met a number of times with Hon Todd McClay and also

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with Hon Tama Potaka (Associate Minister of Housing – Social Housing). Restore

Rotorua was extremely concerned that MHUD had made no progress in reducing the

number of CEH Motels and obviously had no exit plan at all. We can only assume it

was always their intention to just apply for another two years and I guess when that

expired another two years and so on.

30. There have been some comments about MHUD reducing the number of CEH Motels

from 13 to 10 motels. However, my understanding is that these three motels withdrew

from the contract early on and not that the contracts were terminated by MHUD.

31. In addition to the ten CEH Motels with resource consents, I understand MHUD have

been operating another two CEH Motels without resource consent, the Tuscany Villas,

Fenton St and Aywon Motel, Trigg Ave. They have advised us that they have given

notice to Tuscany Villas and it will be exited by 15 December 2024. They intend to

continue to use Aywon Motel, which they advise is at full capacity until at least June

next year.

32. The meetings with Todd McClay and Tama Potaka have been very constructive and

have resulted in MHUD changing their position to exiting three CEH Motels by 15

December 2024, in-line with the decision and exiting Tuscany Villas by the same date.

33. Restore Rotorua continues to be contacted by the media and although we do respond

and raise concerns, we have tried to be careful not to add to the very negative

perception that has been created for Rotorua with such an intense use of Emergency

Housing Motels.

34. Although all Government departments constantly denied people were being brought

to Rotorua for emergency housing, a Report by MSD eventually showed at least 30

percent of people were not locals. I understand the criteria to be classified a local is

very low. You have lived here for 30 days or have some sort of association with

Rotorua. My family lived in Taupo for 3 months when I was 7 years old and that would

make me a local.

35. We have been advised that the practise of MSD bringing or sending people to Rotorua

has stopped. We have been misled and lied to by these Government departments so

many times now that I do not believe them and although the numbers may have

dropped, I am concerned this practice is still happening to some extent.

36. Restore Rotorua continues to stay in touch with its members via newsletters from

Jenny Peace, other information including newspaper articles, radio interviews, our

Facebook page, etc.

37. On a personal note, I find myself being approached by people in the community,

sometimes by phone or messages but mostly when out on the street. I have received

a lot of disappointment from people that after all we as a community went through at

the 2022 resource consent hearings and the huge number of people who submitted

that MHUD has not abided by the resource consents.

38. Many people who submitted last time said they will not submit this time because it is

simply a waste of time and effort. They see the whole process as completely broken

with little if any notice taken of them. It seems that Government departments are

willing to spend huge amounts of tax payer money and the "system" allows this to

happen.

General observations of the ongoing effects of transitional and emergency housing from

motels in Central Rotorua

39. As I said earlier in my evidence our home was burgled and then subject to arson on 7

February 2024. The police recovered CCTV footage of a person who they told us was

living in emergency housing attempting to sell some of my wife's jewellery in a store

in Rotorua later that same day. Another home in Sumner Street was also burgled the

next night, allegedly by the same persons.

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40. I reported to the Panel at the 2022 Hearing that our youngest daughter, her husband

and their four children had moved to Nelson as they believed with the excessive

emergency housing and what goes with it that Rotorua was no longer a safe place to

bring up a family.

41. I can now report that our other daughter Jenny, her husband and four children have

moved to Lake Tarawera to escape the issues associated with emergency housing

motels. Their previous home was about 800 metres from us and now they live 22

kilometres away.

42. You may recall our daughter spoke of our 8-year-old granddaughter asking why they

hear so many sirens. Emily who has just turned 11 of her own fruition commented

recently how she did not hear the sirens anymore since moving to the lake.

43. There continues to be a bad look for Rotorua, especially along Fenton Street where

many of the exited MSD Voucher motels remain messy and uncared for.

44. The security fencing and security guards at CEH Motels certainly does not give a

welcoming or safe feel to our city.

45. There continues to be a large number of shopping trollies abandoned around

Glenholme.

46. Police cars are often at CEH Motels. There are two CEH Motels at the end of our

current street on the corner of Robertson and Fenton Streets. I have noticed police

there on many occasions, even at both motels at the same time.

47. A few weeks ago, my wife was driving into town to pick up our grandson and as she

approached Fenton Street there was a group of children aged between maybe 8 to 13

years who rushed onto the road blocking her. They were immediately in front of the

car making aggressive and abusive gestures at her. She stopped and put the car into

reverse to leave and then they all ran into the CEH Midway Motel. My wife was scared,

shaken and upset by the incident.

48. Last year someone tried to break into a guest's car at our property in Sumner Street,

in the early hours of the morning. The police dog managed to track the person to a

emergency housing motel but they said there were so many teenagers in there that

they could not identify the offender. This was not a CEH Motel but to us and the public

we regard them as the same. I know there is security at CEH Motels but no one knows

what the occupants are up to once they leave the property, either through the gate

or over a fence.

49. I have seen on Facebook CCTV footage of a person climbing over the fence at Midway

Motel to escape through the neighbour's property.

50. I have some serious concerns about the agencies that MHUD are contracting to

provide these services.

51. At a recent meeting with Mayor Tania Tapsell, she advised us that RLC have put more

CCTV cameras into the CBD and now they are going to put more CCTV cameras in the

Glenholme area.

**Workability of existing resource consents** 

52. As I understand it, the original Resource Consents were granted for two years to allow

MHUD adequate time to relocate the people living in these properties. Instead of

MHUD reducing the numbers of people and number of properties as people leave,

they have just continued to place more and more people into CEH.

53. Did MHUD ever make an effort to reduce the numbers or was it always their plan to

simply apply for another two years? They clearly had no exit plan at the time they

were meant to submit it to RLC. And it seems no one at MHUD is being held

accountable for this.

54. It is the position of Restore Rotorua that all applications for extensions should be

declined.

55. On a personal note, I would respectfully request that if you decide to grant any

extensions of the resource consents that there needs to be exact and compelling

conditions relating to an exit plan.

56. I believe that if they say they are going to close Apollo, Alpin and Pohutu by June 2025

and you decide to grant the resource consents then they should only be granted

consent for those properties until then.

57. They say other CEH Motels will be closed over the months from June 2025 leading up

to 15 December 2025. I believe that dates need to be locked in to ensure this happens.

58. I am afraid that I simply do not trust the Government agencies that are involved with

the homeless in Rotorua.

CONCLUSION.

59. Based on what I have discussed above I respectfully request that the seven CEH

resource consent adpplications are declined.
